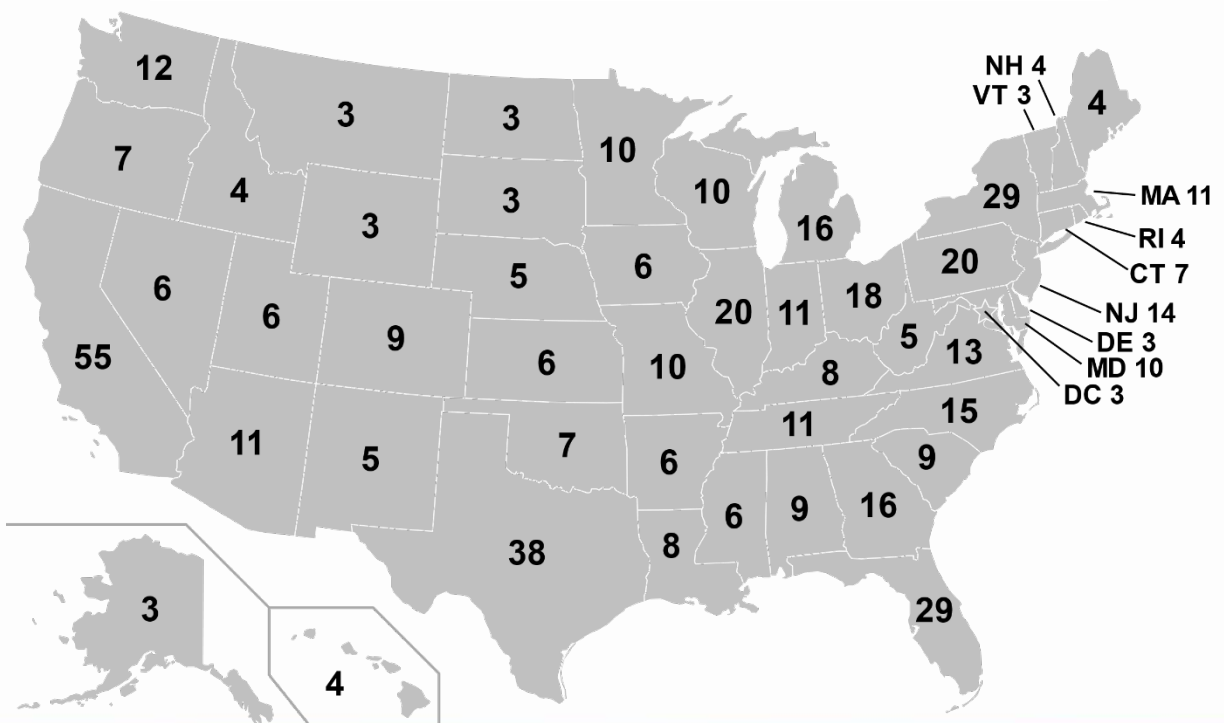

Senate Majority

The Republican Party currently controls 53 of the 100 Senate seats. Republicans will maintain a majority if they lose fewer than 3 seats or lose fewer than 4 seats and maintain control of the White House. The Democratic Party could gain control of the Senate by gaining a net of 4 seats or gaining three seats and the White House.
